Eastertime:

Easter is not one day, but fifty!



First, we kept the forty days, with praying, fasting and works of love. Then we celebrated the three days of Christ's passion, dying and rising. Now we delight in the fifty days of Easter, with rejoicing, feasting and giving witness! The season of Easter is fifty days long. It is a time of unbridled joy, of exuberant rejoicing.

Why is Eastertime fifty days?

The ancient cultures that gave us the Bible had great respect for numbers. They believed that numbers contained hints about God and the meaning of life. The number seven was thought to contain fullness: There are seven days in the week, according to God's original way of ordering time, creating all that there is and resting. And so if you multiply 7 times 7, you have "fullness times fullness."

But wait! 7 times 7 is 49! And with God, there is always more—more than we can ever imagine. So our season of Easter is even more than "fullness times fullness." It's "fullness times fullness" and then some: 7 times 7 plus 1. That's what love is like: more than we can ever imagine. That's what heaven, life with God, is like: more than we can ever imagine.

The fifty days of Easter are days for looking for the risen Lord among us, for hearing in each other's stories of rising from the big and small deaths, days when we experience something of Christ's triumphs. That's why we look to the newly baptized: at Easter, they died and rose with Christ! Now they take their places with us. Together, like the apostles who were so full of the Spirit that people thought they were drunk, we rush about with good and giddy news: Death is not the last word! Life and love are forever!

And slowly, painstakingly, we work together, alongside the risen Christ, to change this world into the world to come. Sing Alleluia!

The book of Exodus tells us the story of our Faith Ancestors being liberated from slavery and led to the Promised Land. Beginning with God calling to Moses to step up, despite his speech difficulties, rocky background, and shyness, to become the one who would lead the Hebrew people to freedom. Pharaoh resisted letting the Hebrew people leave for a while until finally he gave in and let Moses take the Hebrew people and leave Egypt. Moses led the Hebrew people through the parted Red Sea and into the desert where they were planning to cross and end in the Promised Land of milk and honey. God's plans for the Hebrew people were interrupted when the people decided to worship a golden calf idol and God punished them with wandering the desert for 40 years. The Exodus.

The Exodus means "the Leaving." The book of Exodus begins the story of the Hebrew people leaving Egypt and wandering in the desert. Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy follow the book of Exodus by telling of all the instructions that God was teaching the Hebrew people as they wandered the desert. God used the time of Exodus to teach the Hebrew people to live in the ways that God wanted for God's people. This way, when the Hebrew people arrived to the Promised Land and settled to build their new communities (starting in the book of Joshua), they would build their communities founded on God's desire for them: a people of grace, mercy, and abundance for all.

In my sermon preparation this week, I was introduced to the thought that this time of pandemic living has been a bit like an Exodus story. A year ago, Covid-19 hit our country and sent us each on a long journey away from our church home. I wonder about the Hebrew people on their Exodus desert journey and the ways they might have empathized with our pandemic journey: feeling lost, grief of what was, grief of things missed, grief of people lost, wondering when it would all come to an end and go back to living a "normal" life.

Which also makes me wonder what the lessons that God has been trying to teach us while we've been living this pandemic life. With God knowing the whole story, more than we know, it makes me think about what God is envisioning for us as we return back to our "new-normal" life - how has God been guiding us and inspiring in us ways that we can build our return to post-pandemic life founded on God's desire for us: to be a people of grace, mercy and abundance for all.



Healthy Ways to Cope with Stress

- Connect with others. Talk with people you trust about your concerns and how you are feeling.
- Take breaks from watching, reading, or listening to news stories, including those on social media. It's good to be informed but hearing about the pandemic constantly can be upsetting. Consider limiting news to just a couple times a day and disconnecting from phone, tv, and computer screens for a while.
- Connect with your community- or faithbased organizations. While social distancing measures are in place, try connecting online, through social media, or by phone or mail.

- Take care of your body.
 - Take deep breaths, stretch, or meditate.
 - o Try to eat healthy, well-balanced meals.
 - Exercise regularly.
 - Get plenty of sleep.
 - Avoid excessive alcohol, tobacco, and substance use.
 - Continue with routine preventive measures (such as vaccinations, cancer screenings, etc.) as recommended by your healthcare provider.
 - Get vaccinated with a COVID-19 vaccine when available.
- Make time to unwind. Try to do some other activities you enjoy.
